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Done in a Day Cultural Clinic and Books Aloud

January was named for Janus, the Roman god of doors and transitions, beginnings and endings. Fittingly, this January heralds many fresh beginnings and important transitions with the JLP's community projects.

"The Books Aloud Program is very effective and offers one-on-one interaction with the children," says Dianne Smith, chair, "It gets them thinking and brings out their creativity and individuality." This successful program will be offering a mission credit training at the Adult Workshop in February and April.

Books Aloud events are held the first Wednesday of every month from October through June at the Joseph E. Coleman Regional Library, Philadelphia, and on the second Saturday of each month at the Free Library of Philadelphia.

This year's Cookie Exchange Done-in-a-Day (DIAD) hosted at the Cooking School of Philadelphia was also a tremendous success. With enthusiastic assistance from the young volunteers of the Cultural Clinic, DIAD donated dozens of tasty cookies to Help Philadelphia. The women of Help Philadelphia also received Thanksgiving dinner baskets containing much-needed food. Additionally, in December, Junior League volunteers read to children at the Cooper Hospital, designed arts and crafts projects, and comforted fragile infants in the neonatal intensive care unit.

"Most of our Done-in-a-Days are filling up three months in advance," explains Deb Nyheim, chair. In the coming months, look for additional DIAD opportunities at Philabundance, Manna, and Smith Playhouse and Playground. Because of great demand, this committee strongly encourages members to sign up online.

Held at Jack's Firehouse Restaurant last October, the Laws of Life orientation luncheon introduced school officials to the Philadelphia Inspired Expressions contest's process and mission. Thirty schools participated in this year's orientation. There will be many changes to Laws of Life this year including a stronger partnership with Todd Pride, co-sponsor of the Philadelphia Inspired Expressions. "Pride is taking on a greater leadership role with this contest as the first step in transitioning the Junior League to a background role with this project," says Justine Hansen, chair.

Last year, over 1700 students participated in sharing their unique expression in essays and artworks. This January, members can participate in the judging process for the Best of School winners during morning and afternoon shifts. Adds Hansen, "You can judge from the comfort of your own home and it is a really nice way to earn mission credits. It is also a wonderful way to see what is on the minds of young people."

PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

Recently, Susan Mostek and I had an opportunity to attend a dialogue with Anne Dalton, the CEO of AJLI, on nominating. The meeting focused on both the process and the function of nominating. AJLI is promoting a more progressive view of nominating as an effective means of identifying and developing new leaders who will move the Junior League forward.

The crux of the message from the dialogue session was that the next generation of leaders in a League should not be the solely determined by the nominating committee. Rather, nominating process should be driven by self-selection and fueled by applications and personal interviews. The nominating committee should also work closely with the President and the Board so they are aware of the strategic direction of the League and have a good sense of the type of leader the League needs at the time. Leaving this discussion, Susan and I were encouraged because the JLP's nominating process is already a strong one and mov-

ing the JLP in the right direction.

Nominating in the JLP follows the principles espoused by AJLI. As anyone who has attended a general membership meeting can attest, self-nomination is encouraged. The identification and development of leaders is not a popularity contest and a woman need not simply hope to be picked for leadership. The nominating process for board positions also involves the completion of an application, for lack of better word, and a personal interview. These tools help to standardize the process, focusing the selection of leaders on the skills they bring to the table.

Part of our structure is that our leadership changes every year. One way to ease the transition from year to year is to have leaders with a consistent vision and who work as a team. Thus, future leaders of the JLP need more than just leadership skills, they also need to share in the strategic direction of the League. In other words, leadership is not all about being in charge or being "queen for a year," but it is about developing a consistent forward thinking vision for the JLP.

Nominating plays an important in achiev-

ing this goal by working closely with the Board. This does not mean that the Board is involved in choosing candidates, but rather that the nominating committee understands what the Board is doing, what it is trying to accomplish, and what it is like to serve on the board. This is done through a combination of participation in the Board by the nominating chair, observation of Board meetings by members of the nominating committee, and a discussion with the President-Elect about her strategic vision for the League and her leadership style, strengths and weaknesses. Using this information along with the pool of candidates, nominating slates a leadership team to move the JLP forward another year.

Soon it will be time for the next board slate to be announced. When it is, appreciate all the hard work that went into developing the team of leaders. And, as always, if you are interested either in a leadership position or on nominating, just contact a member of the nominating committee.

EVT would like to encourage members to attend a valuable discussion with Dr Deborah Ledley, Ph.D. who will present Relational Aggression and discuss female "bullying." Bullying is an increasing problem in our schools not only with boys, but also manifests in the subtle ways that girls harass and victimize each other. Dr. Ledley will present some findings on relational victimization (i.e., what it is, how common it is, what the short and long term outcomes are), what parents can do to prevent victimization (ex: things like making sure your child has a best friend, a special ability/talent that they feel good about, teaching them good social skills/responses to teasing). The session will end with a discussion on how to deal with schools where victimization is happening and how parents can deal with their OWN distress when their kids are victimized.

Due to the nature of this event, this will be open to non-JLP members whom you feel may benefit from this discussion.

Hot Crab and Cheese Dip

From Bicentennial Cookbook
8 oz package cream cheese
2 tbs milk
6 oz can crabmeat
Pinch of salt
1 tsp grated onion
1 tbsp horseradish
1 tbsp Worcestershire
Tabasco to taste
Slivered almonds
1 tsp lemon juice

Cream cheese with milk – add crabmeat, salt, horseradish, Worcestershire sauce, lemon juice, onion, and Tabasco. Mix well. Pour into buttered casserole and sprinkle with almonds. Bake ½ hour at 375 degrees. Serve hot with favorite crackers.

1-cup flour	3 cups white wine
1 tbsp paprika	3 cups water
1 tbsp garlic powder	6 chicken bouillon cubes
1 tbsp ground pepper	12 red potatoes, unpeeled, halved
2 lbs veal, cut into 1-inch cubes	12 carrots, sliced into ½ inch slices
1-2 tbsp shortening	1 large white onion, finely chopped
3 Large yellow onions, sliced into ¼ inch slices	1 12-ounce bag frozen peas
	1-pint heavy cream

Combine flour, paprika, garlic powder and pepper in a paper bag. Drop in veal pieces one handful at a time and shake to coat with flour mixture. Remove from bag and set aside.

Heat shortening in a stew pot and when hot, add veal pieces and brown. Remove meat from pot. Add yellow onions to the pot, sauté until limp. Return meat to the pot and add the wine, water, and bouillon cubes. Cook over moderate heat for ½ hour. Add potatoes, carrots, and white onion and cook another ½ hour or until potatoes and carrots are cooked through. The stew can be refrigerated or frozen at this point. Before serving, add peas and cream. Heat until piping hot throughout. Serves 6-8
